# Salit

## PROTECTING A VULNERABLE COMMUNITY

In 2002, in an effort to protect its citizens from Palestinian suicide attackers, Israel constructed a Security Barrier. During the Second Intifada, 800 Jewish men, women, and children were murdered by horrific terrorist suicide bombs and other terror attacks. The Security Barrier ultimately stopped the suicide bombers and saved many lives. The Barrier continues to draw global condemnation to this day, while news and social media regularly depict Israel as Goliath. But in reality, Israelis remain vulnerable to harm from terrorists, as terrorist infiltrations still occur daily.

Salit is a thriving community in northern Samaria, located adjacent to Israel's Security Barrier. Over the years, residents enjoyed relative safety, as Israel's military stationed nearby patrolled the Security Barrier, managed its surveillance system, and responded to potential threats nearby. Recently, Salit has faced a declining sense of security. Arabs from nearby hostile villages have infiltrated and burglarized six homes in the middle of the night while the families were home, asleep in their beds. Thank God no one was killed or injured during these robberies, but their sense of security has significantly decreased. In Judea and Samaria, what starts as burglary-motivated Arab infiltrations will likely end up as full-blown terrorist attacks.

After the most recent infiltration, Salit uncovered some chilling and disturbing facts. First, the Arab infiltrators entered Salit after they breached the Security Barrier completely undetected by military forces, due partially to a system malfunction. Worse, after decades of military presence, military personnel were recently relocated about an hour away and are no longer patrolling nearby. Suddenly and unexpectedly, Salit has to fend for itself.

Salit is ill-prepared to face this new reality. Having consulted with a security expert, they recently hired a night patrolman, but they need your help to purchase a vehicle so he can patrol the community efficiently. In addition, Salit desperately needs a surveillance camera system to alert first responders to potential threats before they become full-fledged terrorist attacks. Also, a section of Salit's perimeter fence is not up to current security codes and desperately needs replacing. Lives are on the line, and time is of the essence.

**Last year, Salit, located adjacent to hostile Arab villages, experienced increased security threats and desperately needs your help to purchase a security vehicle, surveillance cameras, and update their security fence. Your support for vital security equipment will save lives! You will help protect the men, women, and children of Salit, enabling them to prevent hostile infiltrations as they continue to develop Biblical Israel.**
