The Bible places special emphasis on the important role that both parents and grandparents have to inculcate God's laws and values into their progeny. Each of the Patriarchs of the nation of Israel, all three of whom were buried in the city's Cave of Machpela, provide the ultimate representation of a binding chain in which Divine tenets were transmitted from Abraham the grandfather to Jacob the grandson through Isaac the son.

Almost 4,000 years after their burial, a resilient Jewish community living amidst thousands of hostile neighbors, exists in Hebron as well as in Kiryat Arba, located right next to the ancient city. Kiryat Arba is also home to a number of elderly residents including Holocaust survivors. Choosing to live in a symbolically important location, many of them have a strong and healthy drive to fill their lives with a consistent routine of meaning and purpose. These devoted residents in Kiryat Arba have an outlet to do so in the community through the Land of Judah Museum. The museum, which showcases hundreds of archeological artifacts attesting to the nation of Israel's heritage in the region of Judah and the city of Hebron, educates children and adults alike about the Biblical history and archaeology of Judea.

The Museum serves members of Kiryat Arba's senior population by giving them a social setting that is specially designed for them. Additionally, the Museum provides them with frequent lectures on the Bible as well as educational field trips focused on the region's archaeological, Biblical and historic importance. All of these activities provide the participants with the tools to educate and pass on Biblical principles to their children and grandchildren.
